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

To do this, we focus on five strategic imperatives that we believe will help us achieve Barbara Bush's grand vision of literacy for all.

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

2022 Key Initiatives

Adult Literacy

Houston's Adult Literacy Blueprint ("Blueprint"), released in 2021 in partnership with the Mayor's Office for Adult Literacy, provides a rationale and framework for increasing adult literacy rates in our city. Our goal is to give more adults a second chance to gain the literacy skills they need to fully engage in the workforce, participate in society, and support their families.

In 2022 we created the **Success Through Adult Literacy (STAR)** program in which we are partnering with five community-based nonprofit adult service providers – Adult Education Center, Neuhaus Education Center, The Alliance, Tejano Center for Community Concerns, and West Houston Assistance Ministries. The STAR program increases each organization's capacity to provide courses, as well as resources to teach more adults English, earn a GED, acquire digital literacy skills, and gain foundational reading and writing skills. Results from these investments will be available in 2023 following the program's first year of implementation. The pilot of STAR was made possible, in part, through support from Phillips 66 and EOG Resources.

In addition to expanding adult literacy program access through STAR, the Foundation invested in the creation of the **Bridge Digital Academy**, a partnership among the Mayor's Office for Adult Literacy, Literacy Minnesota, and the Corporation for National and Community Service's AmeriCorps Volunteers in Service to America program. Through this partnership, we are providing resources to aid in the design of a national digital literacy curriculum and supporting local organizations as they implement coursework that will provide low-income adults with digital literacy certification, workforce training, and skills that will meet the needs of employers and families, with potential increases in employment opportunities. During 2022, 243 low-income adults completed the Bridge Digital Academy program.

Third Ward Schools Initiative/UH Cougar Tutor Program

The UH Third Ward Schools Initiative (TWSI) is a partnership among the University of Houston's Advancing Community Engagement and Service (ACES) Institute and the five HISD elementary schools located in Third Ward -- Blackshear, Hartsfield, Foster, Lockhart, and Thompson. The Barbara Bush Houston Literacy Foundation has been a partner and funder of TWSI since the program's inception six years ago, providing program funding to support UH Cougar Literacy Tutors, program operations, instructional materials, and program evaluation.

Through the UH Cougar Tutor Program, UH students are hired, trained, and placed in elementary classrooms within high-need schools to support literacy instruction. Tutors lead sessions in small groups or individually to build student vocabulary, comprehension, fluency, and other reading skills. During 2021-2022 school year, the Foundation provided funding for over 30 UH Cougar Tutors who provided more than 10,000 hours of tutoring to students in designated classrooms.

Based on the program evaluation, 4 out of 5 participating schools increased its rating by the Texas Education Agency from 2018-2019 academic year to 2021-2022 academic year.

2022 Key Initiatives

Family Place Libraries

Pre-literacy skills are imperative for children entering kindergarten. When it comes to learning how to read, many parents are unsure of where to start and lack the resources necessary to prepare their child for success in school. One key strategy we have enacted to help parents be their child's first and most important teacher and increase kindergarten readiness levels is to equip each branch of the **Houston Public Library** (HPL) and **Harris County Public Library** (HCPL) with a **George & Barbara Bush Family Place Library** by the end of 2025.

George & Barbara Bush Family Place Libraries are modeled after **Family Place** Libraries[™], a national, evidence-based model in which library staff receive specialized training and become equipped to expand programs specifically for toddlers and their parents. In addition, the specially designed spaces feature a multitude of interactive materials, early literacy kits, games, toys, music, multimedia resources, learning stations, and of course, books.

During 2022, seven new George and Barbara Bush Family Places opened and

are providing programming for parents – Houston Public Central Library, Collier Regional Library, Evelyn Meador Branch Library, Galena Park Branch Library, Lone Star College Cy-Fair Library, North Channel Branch Library, and Park Place Regional Library. Since the initiative's launch in 2018, 19 Family Places have been installed in area library branches, with six more due to open by the end of 2023.

The George & Barbara Bush Family Place Libraries have been made possible, in part, through the generosity of Phillips 66, PNC Foundation and the Ladies for Literacy Guild.

My Home Library


Access to books in the home is linked to improved academic performance, better writing skills, reduced dropout rates, increased income levels, and time spent reading for enjoyment. We are making strides to close the gap in book access for our youngest, most vulnerable children and their families through My Home Library.

In collaboration with school districts and community-based organizations and through the generous support of our donors, we provided nearly **33,000 Houston children** enrolled in more than 80 schools and early childhood centers a home library of six books each. Since the program's creation in 2017, the Foundation has distributed more than **150,000 home libraries**, and we are on track to distribute our one millionth book by the end of 2023.



Camp Adventure

The Barbara Bush Houston Literacy Foundation, in partnership with **HISD** and **Children's Museum Houston**, hosted our Camp Adventure summer learning program held at Atherton Elementary School in Fifth Ward and Blackshear Elementary School in Third Ward. By integrating high-quality programs like Camp Adventure into the regular summer school curriculum, we addressed the need for additional academic and socioemotional support, bridging the achievement gap and offering unique learning opportunities.

Camp Adventure provided nearly 300 students with immersive, hands-on learning projects in various disciplines such as science, technology, engineering, math, art, and reading. Activities included circuit assembly, dissection of squid and cow eyes, meteorite creation, and DNA extraction. Over 100 volunteers committed their time to engaging with students and collectively served 327 volunteer hours.

Contributions from organizations including Phillips 66, Children's Museum of Houston, HISD, JP Morgan Chase, KPMG, State Farm, Kinder Morgan, Marathon Oil, Crestwood, Amazon, Reliant, Target, Houston Astros Foundation, the Ladies for Literacy Guild and our Young Professionals Group played a crucial role in creating a transformative summer learning experience for Houston's children.

Ladies for Literacy

The Ladies for Literacy Guild is a dynamic group of more than 325 women who care deeply about our city. Since its formation in 2015, the Guild has served as a force for good by creating children's libraries in community centers, championing the Curiosity Cruiser mobile library initiative, boosting capacity and access to literacy programs for children and families, serving as reading role models in elementary schools, and more.

During 2022, the Ladies for Literacy Guild sponsored home libraries for over 2,800 economically disadvantaged HISD students through the Foundation's My Home Library program and provided funding in support of the Camp Adventure summer learning program. Guild members also volunteered regularly in first- and second-grade classrooms at three HISD elementary

schools as part of our Reading Roundup initiative. Not only did the Guild invest their time and talent in expanding the Foundation's program impact and mission, but it also provided grants to community-based nonprofits, including Spring Branch Boys & Girls Club and Christian Community Service Center.

Curiosity Cruiser

One of the signature initiatives of the Ladies for Literacy Guild is the Curiosity Cruiser mobile library initiative, a partnership with **Harris County Public Library** (HCPL). In 2022, thanks to support from Oxy, Crown Castle, Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, and PwC, the Guild donated a fourth Curiosity Cruiser outfitted with technology, STEM resources, and books, to HCPL. Additional investments in the Curiosity Cruiser mobile library initiative were generously provided by Citgo, Reliant and the many sponsors and donors of the Power of Literacy Luncheon.

During the year, more than 13,000 children received books and/or participated in after school and summer STEM and reading programming. Collectively, the fleet hosted 318 outreach events and traveled 8,963 miles to serve children in low-income neighborhoods across Harris County.

Young Professionals Group

The Young Professionals Group (YPG) is a purpose-driven organization of over 150 individuals developing new ways of leading literacy through service and dedication in Houston. The YPG has provided financial support for several initiatives, including My Home Library at Lantrip Elementary, supplies for Camp Adventure, and backpacks filled with books and supplies for Nativity Academy of Houston, House of Tiny Treasures, and Small Steps Nurturing Center campuses.

Barbara's Book Boxes

Barbara's Book Boxes are community embedded resources strategically deployed in high-foot traffic, high-need neighborhoods to improve book access among residents. Book boxes employ a "take a book, leave a book" policy, encouraging communities to share their stories. The Barbara Bush Houston Literacy Foundation, YPG, Precinct 1, and Fifth Ward GO Neighborhood Community installed 14 new Barbara's Book Boxes in Fifth Ward. This initiative, led by the Foundation's Young Professionals Group, aims to provide underserved children and their families with increased access to books, fostering a love for reading and sharing. Thanks, in part, to the generous support of MD Anderson and Oxy, a total of 23 little libraries are stocked and accessible to families in high need neighborhoods across the city of Houston.


Nativity Academy of Houston Library

Dedicated YPG volunteers assisted in the transformation of this space, working to create an inviting and inspiring environment for all library visitors. The refreshed space provides opportunities for students and teachers to read, learn, and engage with a variety of literacy resources to support classroom learning.

Our signature event, *A Celebration of Reading* was attended by 700 guests at The Post Oak Hotel. Through our partnership with KPRC 2, a one-hour commercial-free broadcast of the

Power of Literacy Luncheon

Nearly 600 guests gathered at the Post Oak Hotel for the seventh annual **Power of Literacy Luncheon: Blooming with Books** hosted by the Ladies for Literacy Guild and co-chaired by mother-daughter duo, Gina Saour and Carolyn Mohsenzadeh. KPRC 2's Lisa Hernandez moderated a discussion with featured guest, actress, producer, writer, philanthropist, mother of five, *New York Times* bestseller "When Life Gives You Pears," and all-around comedic force, Jeannie Gaffigan.

The luncheon raised more than \$500,000 for the Guild's literacy signature programs, including the Curiosity Cruiser mobile library initiative. Phillips 66 served as Title Sponsor, and Stavis & Cohen Private Wealth, Cathy Cleary and Rhonda Graff, and Sidney Faust served as Literacy Champion Sponsors. Storybook Gala

More than 350 guests were off to see the wizard and followed the yellow brick road, "Somewhere Over the Rainbow," to the 7th annual Storybook Gala. Hosted by the Barbara Bush Houston Literacy Foundation's Young Professionals Group, this year's "party with a purpose" was held at Hotel ZaZa Museum District and chaired by Joselyn & Jeff Carnrite and Kasey & Nick Carnrite. Nearly \$330,000 was raised for the YPG's literacy initiatives, including building a library at Nativity Academy of Houston and supporting Camp Adventure.
